The regular meeting of the Storm Water Utility Committee was held on Wednesday, December 14, 2011 in Room 202 of the Municipal Building. The following members were present: Chairman Anthony Nudo, Vice Chairman G. John Ruffolo, Aldermen Steve Bostrom, Patrick Juliana, and Jan Michalski. Alderman Ray Misner was excused. The meeting was called to order at 4:42 pm. Staff members in attendance were Mike Lemens, Mayor Bosman and City Administrator, Frank Pacetti.

- A-1 Approval of minutes of special meeting held on December 5, 2011.
It was moved by Alderman Bostrom, seconded by Alderman Michalski to approve. Motion passed 5-0.
- C-1 Final Report from City Administrator and Mayor on June 30, 2011 storm damage cleanup. (Report to be handed out at meeting).
Chairman Nudo said he would like a final report of what happened following the June 30th storm with a good explanation of events. Mr. Pacetti said he will put together a timeline of events. Vice-chairman Ruffolo said the policy is an outline but it needs more procedures. Alderman Juliana agreed that he would like some clarity with what the procedures would be following an emergency. Alderman Michalski said it is important to have an emergency policy in place as his district was hit hardest. He also said it is necessary to have a policy so that what happened following this storm is not repeated. Mr. Pacetti did say he felt the policy did include specific tasks and duties. Chairman Nudo would like emergencies defined, who declares an emergency and how the public, staff, city officers and residents know when an emergency has been declared included in the outline.
It was moved by Alderman Bostrom, seconded by Alderman Ruffolo to defer for 30 days. Motion passed 5-0.

STAFF COMMENTS:

Mike Lemens informed the committee that the city has received a grant for Fund for Lake Michigan for water monitoring and the pike river.

ADJOURNMENT - There being no further business to come before the Storm Water Utility Committee, it was moved, seconded and unanimously approved to adjourn the meeting at 4:57 pm.

WHEREAS, the City has duly noticed and will hold a public hearing on the proposed Amendment, following the procedures in Section 66.1001(4)(d) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Kenosha Common Council hereby adopts the Kenosha County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update: 2011-2015 dated June, 2010.

FACT SHEET: KENOSHA COUNTY HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN UPDATE

BACKGROUND

The Kenosha County hazard mitigation plan update, which revises the County's initial 2005 hazard mitigation plan, sets forth the most appropriate, feasible, and effective hazard mitigation strategy for Kenosha County and the local units of government within the County over the period 2011 through 2015. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requires that the plan be reviewed and updated every five years. The updated plan, which was prepared by the staffs of the Kenosha County Division of Emergency Management, the Kenosha County Division of Planning and Development, and the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC), is documented in SEWRPC Community Assistance Report No. 278 (2nd edition), *Kenosha County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update: 2011-2015*, March 2011.

Preparation and adoption of the updated plan is necessary to retain County eligibility for mitigation funding for the FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program and the Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program administered by the Wisconsin Department of Military Affairs, Division of Emergency Management (WEM). All of the municipalities in the County are covered by the plan.

The plan was developed under the guidance of the Kenosha County All Hazards Mitigation Plan Task Force, which was created by the County specifically for plan development purposes and is comprised of elected and appointed officials; agency and business representatives; and citizens from throughout the County knowledgeable in hazard mitigation matters. Where appropriate, the members of the original Task Force were reappointed for this plan update. In assembling the Task Force, the County Planning and Development Division and Division of Emergency Management sought representatives from a cross-section of community interests. The chief elected official of each municipality in the County was invited to participate. Invitations to participate on the Task Force were sent by to over 47 people, including elected and appointed officials and representatives of law enforcement agencies, fire departments, public health departments, public works departments, and private sector firms. Also, the County issued a news release announcing the formation of the Task Force and inviting participation.

The Task Force met three times during the plan preparation period to provide input on the types of hazards to be considered and appropriate mitigation strategies, and to review the draft report chapters. Copies of draft plan chapters were placed in downloadable form on the website of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) and a webpage was available on the website so members of the public could ask questions and submit comment upon the draft plan update. When the draft plan was completed, a public informational meeting was held at the Kenosha County Center on October 28, 2010.

FOCUS OF THE PLANNING EFFORT

The focus of this planning effort is upon hazard mitigation measures. Such measures generally involve long-term, often permanent, measures designed to reduce the exposure to, probability of, or potential risk to human life and property from hazardous events. Such measures tend to focus on actions related to where and how to build structures, education to reduce losses or injury, and programs to improve the safety of identified hazard areas. A hazard mitigation plan outlines the strategy for mitigating the hazards potentially impacting a county or municipality.

The mitigation plan should be distinguished from, but compatible with, an emergency operations plan. Such a plan is defined as a plan which describes how people and property will be protected in disaster and disaster threat situations; details who is responsible for carrying out specific actions; identifies the personnel, equipment, facilities, supplies, and other resources available for use in the disaster; and outlines how all actions will be coordinated.

PLANNING ANALYSIS AND PLAN COMPONENTS

The analysis includes three components: 1) profile and analysis of hazard events; 2) community vulnerability assessments; and 3) development of hazard mitigation strategies.

The updated plan reviews implementation of the initial plan and includes revised and updated inventories of:

- Demographic data,
- Existing and planned land use,

- Transportation and utility systems,
- Critical community facilities,
- Existing regulations and programs, and
- Hazard occurrence and expected damages.

The updated plan takes an “all hazards” approach and identifies and provides mitigation strategies for a variety of hazards including both natural hazards and human-induced hazards. Natural hazards identified include:

- Flooding,
- Thunderstorms, high winds, hail, and lightning,
- Tornadoes,
- Extreme temperatures,
- Winter storms,
- Lake Michigan coastal erosion,
- Drought,
- Fog, and
- Wild fires

Human-induced hazards identified include:

- Transportation accidents,
- Contamination or loss of water supply,
- Hazardous material incidents,
- Terrorism, and
- Power outage

The updated plan identifies and recommends priority mitigation strategies for the identified hazards. For flooding, the recommended priority mitigation strategies include:

- Floodland and wetland zoning and zoning review,
- Preservation of open space and sensitive areas,
- Purchase, demolition, and removal or floodproofing of 318 structures,
- Stream channel clearing, maintenance, or rehabilitation,
- Stormwater management planning, regulation, and facility maintenance,
- National Flood Insurance Program map updating,
- Elevation surveys of buildings near flood hazard areas, and
- Restoration of prairies and wetlands.

Recommended priority mitigation strategies for weather-related hazards include:

- Maintaining early warning systems,
- Public information and education,
- Identifying and advertizing shelters,
- Reviewing and enforcing building code requirements, and
- Coordination of local government emergency operations and response plans.

Recommended priority mitigation strategies for human induced hazards include:

- Public information and education,
- Continued coordination of emergency response, and
- Continued support of training, equipping, planning, and preparedness for emergency responders.

Subject: *Addendum to Professional Services Agreement with Mandlik and Rhodes Information Systems, Inc. for Redemption Processing of Yardwaste Coupons.*

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Kenosha Stormwater Utility has received an addendum to extend the Mandlik and Rhodes Information Systems, Inc. Professional Service Agreement until December 31, 2012. This contract allows the Stormwater Utility to begin the 2012 Yardwaste Coupon Program into 2012.

The annual administrative cost to Mandlik and Rhodes, dependent upon the number of coupons processed and participating stores, would be approximately \$4,200. The coupon redemption cost will be \$2 per box or bundle of 10 biodegradable bags with an additional \$0.08 retailer incentive per coupon, \$150 coupon setup fee and postage fees.

The Stormwater Utility will offer the \$2 coupon to be used on any box or bundle of 10 City approved biodegradable bags, Bag to Nature, BIOBAG and ECOGUARD.

The coupons will be available once the coupons are printed (an example of the coupon is provided). The Yardwaste Coupon Program is planned to be in place prior to the Spring Yardwaste Curbside Collection Season.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the Addendum between the Kenosha Stormwater Utility and Mandlik and Rhodes Information Systems, Inc to extend their current contract until December 31, 2012, authorize the Director to execute the contract and approve the 2012 coupon layout. The funding for the yardwaste coupons will be paid for out of the Stormwater Utility account 501-09-50102-219 from which the yardwaste coupon program was budgeted \$69,150.

- Project #10-1130 Vehicle Wash System Installation Truck Wash** – [Interclean] The punchlist on the truck wash is currently being completed. The wash is operational but training is still being conducted on the operations. (15)
- Project #10-1131 River Crossing Swale Restoration** – [Applied Ecological Services] The current is developing plans for the enhancement of the swale that will be planted in spring if the weather is favorable. A public information meeting will be scheduled in March. (17)
- Project #11-1128 Multi-Plate Pipe Storm Sewer Inspection and Evaluation** – [Ruekert-Mielke] The consultant is gathering additional costs needed for the survey and additional data needed for completion of an alternative analysis for a permanent repair for the multi-plate system. A meeting is scheduled for the next few weeks to discuss the additional costs and the benefits it will provide. (2)
- Project #11-1125 Pennoyer Beach Outfall Stormwater Infiltration Basin (GLRI Grant)** – [AECOM] Plans are approximately 90% completed and a second public information meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 12th to meet with residents regarding the parkway bioswales. (1)
- Project #11-1127 MacWhyte Water Quality Basin** – [Cicchini] The pond is complete but the contract will remain open until seed germination is verified in the spring. (1)
- Project #11-1135 Stormwater Management Plan Development** – Staff is completing the second stage in the consultant selection process. The formal proposals from 4 consultants are due January 6th. (citywide)
- Project #11-1137 Pike River Monitoring (WI Coastal Management Grant)** –Staff is nearing completion of a contract with the City of Racine Health Department for the monitoring and testing work associated with this grant. Upon completion of the contract it will be presented to the Committee. (1 and 4)
