

Alternate Side Parking

Alternate side parking is in effect each year from December 1st through March 31st between the hours of 1:00 am and 6:00 am.

If the day of the month is an odd number, park on the side of the roadway bearing odd-numbered addresses.

If the day of the month is an even number, park on the side of the roadway bearing even-numbered addresses.

When parking a car before midnight, park on the side required for the next day.

Fire Hydrants & Roadway Inlets

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

Fire Hydrants and Inlets should be kept free and clear of snow to ensure the safety of your neighborhood in case of an emergency.

Roadway Inlets should be kept clear of snow and ice to reduce the risk of roadway flooding during heavy rain events and snow melting.

We need your help to remove snow from hydrants and inlets during heavy snowfall events. The Street Division crews are unable to clear snow around fire hydrants.

Snow Emergencies

The City will declare a snow emergency when snow conditions have reached a depth of four inches (4") or when the City determines the snow is causing hazardous driving conditions.

When a declared snow emergency is in effect, **NO PARKING IS ALLOWED ON ANY CITY ROADWAY AT ANY TIME.** For snow emergency and parking information, during a winter storm, listen to:

Street Division is open continuously during snow fighting operations.

City Snow & Ice Control Operations

The City is divided into ten snow routes to organize and manage snow fighting operations. Snow plows and salters are dispatched to all ten snow routes simultaneously.

During major plowing operations, City employees from several Departments, who are trained to operate snow plowing equipment assist the Street Division.

Snow Plowing

When winter storms produce less than four inches (4") of snowfall, the City snow plowing crews will plow priority snow routes only. These include highly traveled main thoroughfares, bus routes, school access roads and posted snow routes.

When storms produce greater than four inches (4") of snowfall, the City will also plow residential roadways. During this type of event, the City's goal is to clear all residential roadways within a 24-hour period following the end of a winter storm.

Alleys will be plowed only after significant snowfalls and after all roadways have been plowed.

Due to the nature of plowing cars parked on streets will unavoidably be plowed in, and driveway approaches may be blocked with snow from the plowing operation.

Posted Snow Routes

The City prohibits parking on posted snow routes after two inches (2") or more of snow has fallen and whenever a snow emergency is in effect. Violators are subject to a citation and their vehicles may be towed.

Anti-Icing

Starting in 2015, the City has the ability to pretreat the roadways with liquid de-icers. Under certain criteria, the treatment is sprayed onto dry pavement prior to a winter storm. The pretreatment helps prevent snow and ice from adhering and bonding to the roadway surface. Specific conditions must exist for anti-icing to be effective, so treatment is not used for every snow event.

If you are following one of the Anti-Icing vehicles, please stay back 100 feet.

Salting

At the beginning of a winter storm, the City spreads salt on the roadways designated as salt routes. These routes include highly traveled main thoroughfares, bus routes, school access roads and posted snow routes. Except for stop signs, hills and curves, the City does not apply salt to residential streets.

The City limits its use of salt to designated routes because of its cost and environmental impacts.

Sidewalk, Driveway & Handicap Ramps Snow

The City requires property owners and occupants to remove snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours following the end of all snow / ice accumulation. All properties that abut a Handicap ramp shall also clear the snow the full width of the ramp and the adjacent curb line for accessibility purposes.

Per Ordinance 5.11.F, failure to remove snow and ice from your sidewalks can result in a cost to the abutting/front property owner. The cost will be billed as a special charge to the property owner for all sidewalk cleared by the City along with a \$70 Administrative fee.

Per Ordinance 7.13G, it is unlawful to shovel, dump, blow, plow or otherwise place snow in any public roadway, highway or alley right-of-way. Violators should be reported and violators may receive a citation.

It is NOT City policy to clear any driveway, parked car or sidewalk blocked as a result of any plowing operation.

Mailbox Policy

In the event snow depth prevents plowing up to the mailboxes, the resident shall be responsible for clearing a path for the delivery of mail .
